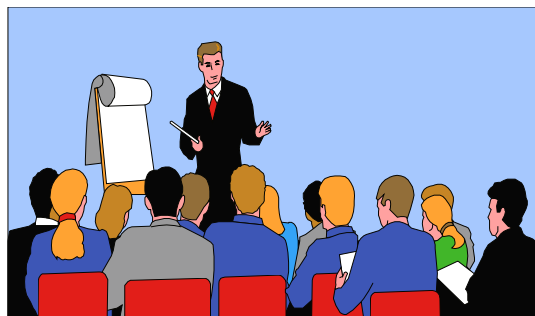

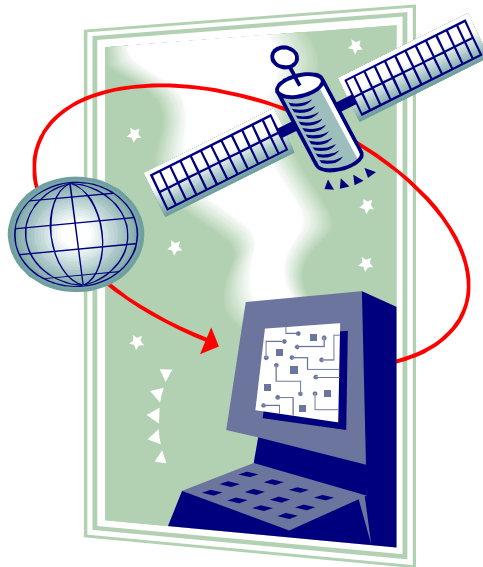

## Internet from the sky

From 1992 to 2002, collection of PC software and other file-based information nearly consumed me. I lived and breathed shareware and did not rest until it

was all nicely cataloged and downloadable, never mind that it was held captive in an aging anachronism known as a Bulletin Board System, which one accessed using a modem and telephone line, and operated by a man whose title and function seemed wizard-like at best and geeky to the less kind. After many months of supporting this throwback data engine, of asking users to unlearn Windows and plumb the inner workings of their modems, I realized that we needed to take the collection to the World Wide Web, over something faster than a single phone line.

What I was doing in the 90s was like asking a community to use Citizen's Band Radios in place of a general telephone system, all the while stating, "You're gonna love it!" over and over again, hoping all would catch the fever.

The fever burned, eventually, in nearly everyone else at the advent of the World Wide Web, circa 1995 when graphical browsers were first made available. But while I made attempts at putting our remarkable file collection on the web, this never amounted to anything serious that looked like the "real" web. I was too busy fluffing up the old character-based, non-mouse-able interface, because to my cripplingly slow phone link (afforded *gratis* by the now-defunct PremierNET.net) would never have supported the graphical web we know of today.

We had games! We had FIDOnet! We had Internet Relay Chat! Always assuming you knew what those things were, knew how to tinker with archaic software clients to bring them alive, and wanted the content that was available. What was really important, at least from an historical perspective, was the files. When the whole thing crashed and burned last year (almost literally - see below), and the system was decommissioned by the board (for good reason), it was months before I realized that I was sitting on a goldmine of information that NOBODY COULD GET TO. I said to myself: It's The Files, Stupid.

In concert with this vague discomfort that my left brain was soon to be decommissioned, PremierNet, on account of their liquidation, pulled the plug. No more free hosting, and there was not enough user support for a file service anyway. It was time to fold 'em. This was over a year ago, I guess near the end of 2002. A month after that, while trying to get our server ready for sale on E-bay, a power supply fried in a shower of sparks, and I was confronted with a one hundred pound doorstop. To be honest, it was probably somewhat of a doorstop before the power supply overload, but fortunately, the six 17 gigabyte hard drives were spared, but themselves became paperweights until I figured how to revive the files in a useable form.

So I wrestled with ways to bring them back, to pry them from the cold platters of all the thick drives that lay about my desk. They could be read just fine from another machine. But I knew that without the BBS to catalog them, they were pretty useless. Finding anything amongst that pile of over 300,000 files would be like walking into the Library of Congress and finding the volumes all stacked about at random with no way to index them.

I even had guys asking me if they could help (Thanks Tom Adams and Gene Iglehart) and I believe there will be a continuing role to play for anyone who would like to help further index this treasure.

I tinkered with indexing software and Microsoft's Indexing Service, and tried to decide if it would be cost effective to burn the files to CD or DVD. Nothing made sense. Every solution I could come up with was too labor intensive and too prone to errors and omissions, or required a software license on your end. There are SO MANY FILES! Each file is a treasure of archaic information, a window on the soul of teenage programmers and system operators that held the nascent internet as an unattainable Nirvana where everyone would be in charge of their own informational destiny. So many failed companies. So many upstart distribution schemes.

The problem with bandwidth is that I live just far enough out of the city to rule out cable or DSL. There are companies out there that promise DSL. They blather on, as if their marketing department has no connection to their operations department. The promise of broadband to those that have dialup is like a call of the Muse. It is like a fake virus with a payload consisting of an advertisement for BellSouth and a gentle let-down of, "Oh, sorry...did you mean DSL? Not yet."

I contacted a high level executive at BellSouth and

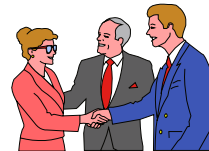

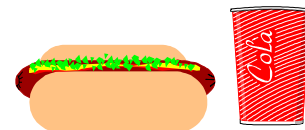

**Also, in June we will have our annual BGAMUG Picnic.**

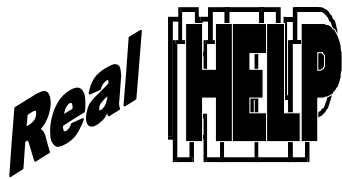

Last month I wrote about the difficulty of finding help for a problem using the Help files that come with software that you use. This is particularly true when you don't know the *precise name* of an action you want to perform or *exactly* how to describe the problem you are having. I promised to lead you to **Real Help** this month. But, of course, this will mean moving outside of your software Help files.

The **first solution**—one that works for many folks—is to find a book that is aimed at helping you to be more productive with your software and to avoid and to correct errors in its use.

If you like this idea, I strongly suggest that you *don't* simply purchase a book solely on the basis of its catchy title, its price, or the recommendations of others. Instead, go to your local bookstore and browse through their collection of books for your selected software product. Check the layout of the book, the print size, the readability of it, illustrations, and the Index. Remember, when going to your book for help with a problem, you probably won't thumb through it; instead, you will go right to the index to guide you to the page that deals with that problem.

The **second solution** can be used even if you purchase a book, because no book can anticipate every possible problem situation. As you may have guessed, this solution involves searching the Internet for an answer. And for this you need to use a search engine.

Although Google ([www.google.com](http://www.google.com)) is extremely popular, you may prefer to use one of the following—check them out: Dogpile ([www.dogpile.com](http://www.dogpile.com)), Ask Jeeves ([www.ask.com](http://www.ask.com)), Yahoo! ([www.yahoo.com](http://www.yahoo.com)), AltaVista ([www.altavista.com](http://www.altavista.com)), or even your MSN, AOL, or other ISP's search capability.

#### MY FIRST EXAMPLE CASE:

In preparation for this article, I thought about one of the problems we addressed last fall—the difficulty of printing the entire width of some web pages in Internet Explorer; often the text is cut off on the right side.

To see what the Internet offers, I first entered **printing problem ie** in Google. (You might as well leave out the little words “in, of, the, for,” etc since search engines ignore them unless they are in a quoted phrase. They also ignore capitals, hyphens, and most other punctuation.)

Well, that search didn't look promising—it was too general, so the returns covered all sorts of Internet Explorer topics. So I then tried a more specific search phrase: **text lost right side printing ie**. Surprisingly, I could see from the first few summaries that this was worse!

My third try, **ie cuts off text printing**, was right on! Every summary on the first screen dealt precisely with our problem. If you are interested in solutions to this vexing problem, try this search.

Then to test the other search engines mentioned above, I entered this same search in them. Every one yielded similarly helpful returns. I especially liked Dogpile because the list looked more helpful than Google's and, like Google, the screen is quite plain—not littered with distracting and space-robbing ads!

#### MY SECOND EXAMPLE CASE:

For this search, I decided to use the example from the March Tech Corner article, i.e., “How to set a brush size in Paint Shop Pro 8.” The product's Help file told me to “Choose a brush type from the Tools Tool palette.” But my dilemma was that “Tools” isn't even on the main menu, and no palette is visible. (Later, I realized that I was already using the “Tool Palette,” but it only allows you to *select* a tool—not to set a brush size or shape!)

For my first Internet search I used: **paint shop pro 8 tools**. This search led to information about the tools in PSP 8 and links to sites for purchasing the product! It was time to add more detail in the search phrase.

For my second attempt, I tried: **paint shop pro 8 tools missing from menu bar**. Well, this was worse! I even got returns relating to restaurant menus and bars. I even tried putting quotes around the three groups of ideas, i.e., “paint shop pro 8” “tools missing” “menu bar,” but this led to a “No Matches” report from *Googel*. *Dogpile* did list results, but they were similar to the previous search.

Third try: **where tools tool palette psp 8** (Sounds like very primitive communication, doesn't it!) Ah ha! Pay dirt! Now the links and summaries look promising since they deal with the toolbars in Paint Shop Pro 8, and some are even tutorials.

Looking at the first tutorial on the list didn't help, so I tried another. After a few attempts to match the PSP menus with what I saw on the tutorial (You can go back and forth between your web browser and your software application with Alt-Tab or mouse clicks.), I finally found the answer. **The PSP 8 Help page is WRONG!**

The brush size and other tool settings are on the “**Tools Options Palette**,” not on the “Tools Palette.” This Options palette can be made visible by pressing F4.

Often, I am able to find the answer to a question on the first try, but we saw here, it sometimes takes several tries.

My main point is that you **can** find the solution to any computer problem on the Internet. (Ain't it grand!) Just don't give up too early, and you'll find **Real Help** there.

demanded their system stopped spamming me, advertising that I can have DSL when this is just not possible in Alvaton at this time. It was and is a cruel practice.

The answer to affordable broadband internet at my house came as much from the past as from current technology. In the late nineties I had gone to the sky for my beloved files, bringing them down from an EchoStar satellite through a service in East Tennessee known as Planet Connect. That was at a paltry 9600 baud, but if you had the link active all the time, we could still get a lot of material through that small pipe. I looked at StarBand Satellite internet in Alvaton a couple of years ago and it was not ready for prime time. There was just too much negative chatter out there on the internet, mostly relating to the skill level of the installer. Also, the gateway (I guess you would call it a cable modem) device had many drawbacks, but has since been improved. In 2004 my wife and I finally decided to buy a dish and dedicate it to broadband. The story of how the dish was erected and connected is entertaining, in a culturally perverse way, and it will be told at another sitting.

The company is Direcway.com. It provides uplink and downlink capabilities, obviating the need for a dedicated phone line and a dial-up ISP account. This was one of the features that made the system work with us. We had four phone lines out here. Two for use with an analog router, that bonded two dialup signals together to make one supposedly bigger data pipe.

This actually worked, but the software was old and the speed was not enlightening. We decided to make do with one phone line and get rid of AOL. I cannot describe the merriment this latter decision unleashed. For one thing it represented a release of one of the final fiduciary attachments to our children. You may feel as if paying for your adult children's internet connection is alright. I think not. Anyway, the \$80 cost of the Direcway service was

more than paid for by the release of these other monthly fees. The internet is fast, shareable, and a reasonable way to unwire the house.

No sooner did the technician leave, and I was summarily shipped off to California for two weeks. This was just cruel. I salved my wound with hotel broadband to keep up with events. I also set up bgamug.net with a service provider called no-ip.com, because I wanted a dynamic DNS capability. Dynamic Domain Name Service allows you to host a site, like bgamug.net, even if your service provider is always changing your actual location on the internet. As it turns out, I didn't need this because Direcway will provide me with a static address, at an extra charge of about \$10 a month. It's nice to know that if that static address ever does change, for whatever reason, I can just update the link between the address and bgamug.net in real time.

Back home, I found a Linksys wireless router for \$80 and had all 4 workstations up and running in short order. For some reason wireless routers seem to connect better than wireless access points. Think of an access point as a plug-in device for a hub to make the hub appear on a wireless network. The router's got the hub already in it.

After fooling with the router for a few days I finally got www.bgamug.net up, and a day later figured out e-mail. There's not much to look at there - only 35000 files as of this writing are indexed, and there is no way to log on as new. You can see the site by entering a user name of Guest and password of guest, at www.bgamug.net.

The moral to this story is you can have high speed internet in the countryside, you can host a web site for under \$100 a month and with a group such as BGAMUG, you can have a reason to go through it all.

### Windows Free Security Update CD Helpful

I ordered the Windows Security Updates CD as soon as it was announced. It arrived a couple weeks ago.

As I wrote last month, The Windows Security Update CD is shipped to you free of charge. This CD includes Microsoft critical updates released through October 2003 and information to help you protect your PC. In addition, you will also receive free antivirus and firewall trial software.

This CD is only available for Windows XP, Windows Me, Windows 2000, Windows 98, and Windows 98 Second Edition (SE)

Recently my computer began to act strange. My Norton's Anti-Virus subscription wasn't due to expire until the 26<sup>th</sup> of April, however, it balked and would not allow me to do a manual update. Nor was I able to access some of the Norton AV support sites. I became increasingly suspicious when I was unable to connect to the Windows Update site. I have since received and installed the latest updates through my automatically scheduled settings and most all other www issues appear normal.

I also detected some strange text strings imbedded into my outgoing email messages from my insightbb account and have discontinued using it. I continue to receive email, but will resort to my Yahoo mail for all outgoing emails.

I have since installed the free trial versions of the Computer Associates **eTrust EZ Anti-virus and EZ Firewall** that came with the Windows Security Updates CD.

The firewall is very similar to the Zone Alarm I have been using, and the AV program is going to be very good also.

I have since decided I will spend most of my vacation in May reformatting my possessed system and reinstalling everything from scratch. The Windows Security Update CD will be a great help with that and I urge all readers, if you have not ordered it, do.

## Review for MS Money Deluxe 2004

Microsoft® Money Deluxe 2004 claims to give you a quick and easy way to organize and manage your personal finances, with powerful, yet easy-to-use tools for financial planning, balancing your checkbook, managing credit and debt, simplifying taxes, and more.

I have recently upgraded from version 2001 to Microsoft Money Deluxe 2004 and am generally pleased with the program. Being a beginner to intermediate computer user, I am still learning a lot about this program even though I have used a Microsoft Money program before for basic personal finances. It has been very user friendly, with just a little confusion.

Sorting each check to the proper category each time has been the hardest part of learning the Money program in general. Once I figured out the many categories, placing more items into the proper category has been easier.

The reports have been a big help also. My personal finances have been much easier to follow and balancing a checkbook is a breeze.

My biggest complaint with Microsoft Money Deluxe 2004 has got to be with the one-year free credit bureau reporting service through Experian. Wanting to check out my personal credit report with this free service, I went through the sign up process. I encountered a line for a credit card number above which was (in bold print) the word “optional”. I don’t use my credit card online and didn’t want to use it so I opted not to. In doing so, I cannot access my credit report. I believe if something says optional then you should be able to choose it or not but in this case the only option is use it or not get the service. I realize that this service is not thru Microsoft but it is available thru a Microsoft product and therefore reflects highly on Microsoft. If the line had stated “required”, I would not have had a problem with it.

I have recently been elected Treasurer of a local computer users group and wanted to keep track of their finances in this program also. It took many hours to figure out how to separate the accounts, income, and expenses on reports that would separate my personal money from the club money finances. I did find the “customize” icon and figured out how this is done through trial and error but a lot of stress and many hours were spent to do this. I had even tried to contact Microsoft for this information and it just wasn’t available without a fee.

I use a local hometown bank so connecting to the internet

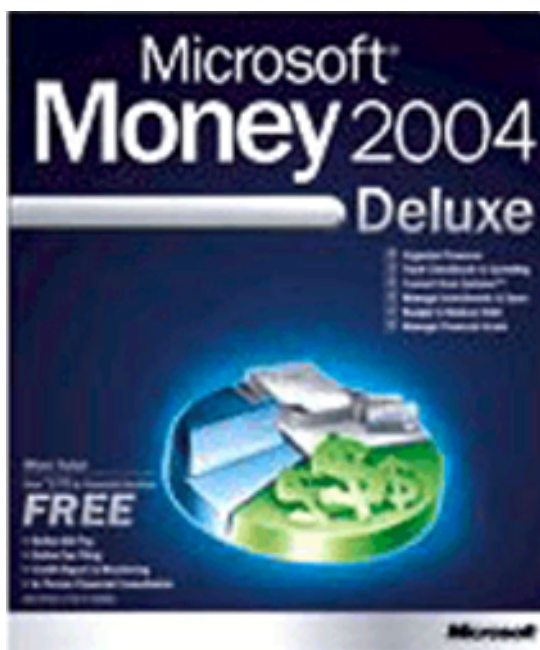
for banking hasn’t been an option. I have never tried online bill-pay and I am not sorry to say I am still wary of it but with one-year free service thru this program, I may try it yet.

I have also not tried some of the other programs available with “Money Deluxe 2004” such as online tax filing from H & R Block, Financial consultation from American Express, or Gainskeeper. Nor do I currently have investments to keep track of. I am sure I will use them in the near future when I begin planning for my retirement and planning to pay off debt.

Money Deluxe 2004 can be purchased at most any computer software retailer. The suggested retail price is \$59.95 but you can expect to pay less with sales and rebate offers.

I would recommend this product to anyone for their personal finances. Once you get everything set up and figure out the proper categories for all expenses and income, doing taxes at the end of the year should be so easy. Also, being able to track your budget, plan for the future, balance your checkbook, keep track of all expenses and whether they are tax deductible, all through the same program, has been a blessing.

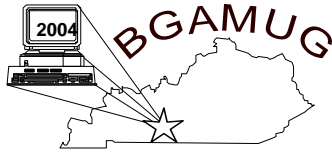
